




The Annual Report, reflecting the activities of the Police Department for 1963, is herewith submitted.


The tragic and unexpected deaths of Chief R. C. Coon and Supervising Police Clerk, Harold F. Broderick, during the year was a great loss to the department and the City of Lodi. They will long be missed.

A departmental reorganization in 1963 resulted in major changes in personnel and classifications with a total of 15 changes being made. I am confident that this reorganization will greatly increase the efficiency of the department. One personnel change noteworthy to mention was the replacement of a male Police Clerk with a Secretary-Matron which is proving to be most successful. It should also be noted that the design of the police uniform has been changed giving it a more attractive appearance.

Looking to the future, a great deal of research, planning and inspection has been made toward the proposed Hall of Justice. We feel the need is most urgent and an early resolution to this problem is highly recommended.

In conclusion I would like to take this opportunity and means to express my personal thanks to you for your invaluable assistance during my first year as Chief of Police. I also wish to thank the personnel of this department for their loyal and harmonious support and co-operation during this trying year of transition.






# Lodi Police Department

## PATROL

This division is the largest and most basic component of any Police Department. Almost every police function is carried on within this division. The officers have as their primary responsibility the protection of life and property, the preservation of the peace and the enforcement of all laws within the city. Their duties not only call for the investigation and apprehension of persons committing crimes, but through systematic patrol the suppression of the availability and chance necessary to commit crimes.

These officers are also required to perform many non-criminal services during the course of their duties. Some of these consist of: house checks for people away from home, bank escorts, funeral escorts, bicycle licensing, assistance to indigent persons, information and many others.

Complement of this division consists of a total of twenty-nine men: 1 Lieutenant, 4 Sergeants, 20 Patrolmen, and 4 Clerk-Dispatchers. They are charged with the police coverage of the entire city at all times. To this end the city has been divided into 4 beats with a patrolman assigned to each beat and held responsible for the policing of this area. The 4 beats are then covered by 3 watches with a Patrol Sergeant in charge of each watch.

## PATROL

On an average day there are a total of 18 Patrol Division personnel on duty to man three watches and the desk. Due to the availability of manpower, it is many times necessary to reduce the 4 beat system to a 3 beat system, creating a much larger area for each officer to patrol.

It is a continuous problem to adequately provide sufficient coverage for the more than 80 miles, excluding alleys, of streets within the city limits. Each beat has been analyzed as to police problems, number of calls and services required, but the situation remains that each beat has approximately 20 miles of streets to be covered by one officer.

## TRAFFIC


This one word "Traffic" creates more problems, injures more people, consumes more manpower and represents the largest monetary loss to the community than any other phase of the police field.

Traffic control and accident investigation is primarily a function of the Patrol Division, but all members of the department are charged with its responsibility.

During 1963, officers of this department investigated 423 reportable accidents involving 76 injuries and 4 fatalities. Officers issued a total of 3,438 citations. In addition, 31,137 parking meter violations were issued.

Comparing this to 1962, 407 reportable accidents were investigated involving 66 injuries and 3 fatalities. This represents an increase of 16 accidents, 10 injuries and 1 fatality.

Traffic is and will continue to be a major problem with the increasing population and motor vehicles, but we pledge a program of strict and impartial enforcement in a determined effort to control traffic and prevent accidents.

## DETECTIVE BUREAU

The Detective Bureau was established in the Lodi Police Department in 1953. This Bureau has now completed ten years of service to the department. The Detective Bureau has two assigned Detectives and are under the supervision of a Police Lieutenant. The Police Lieutenant also supervises the Juvenile Bureau and Identification Bureau.

These three bureaus comprise the Investigation Division of the Lodi Police Department.


This consolidation of bureaus brings about a coordinated working effort between the bureaus and allows for a flexible exchange of information and manpower assistance when needed in the respective bureaus.

The duties of the Detective Bureau are many and varied. The Bureau investigates burglaries, robberies, worthless checks, gambling violations and many other crimes.

In the year 1963 the Bureau conducted 120 investigations for outside agencies and 728 local investigations.

In conjunction with the crime investigations, the Bureau handles the service of both misdemeanor and felony warrants. For the year 1963 the Bureau investigated and/or served a total of 1,506 warrants. The Bureau has the further responsibility of maintaining custody of all physical evidence submitted for safe keeping by officers of this department.

The Bureau also maintains liaison with the District Attorney's Office on criminal matters and pending court cases. A close working liaison is also maintained with other local, state and federal police agencies.

## JUVENILE BUREAU

The Juvenile Bureau of the Police Department is part of the Investigation Division. The case load includes referrals from other units in the department as well as original investigations of offenses committed by juveniles.

The Juvenile Bureau has four major functions:


1. The protection of children.
2. Discovery of the delinquent.
3. Investigation of the circumstances involved.
4. The referral of the case to the proper agency.

An annual bicycle safety inspection is held at all schools in our jurisdiction at the beginning of the school year. The defects found are noted, the child's name is taken and a letter is sent to the parents requesting them to put the bicycle in a safe operating condition.

Crimes committed by or involving juveniles are assigned by the Division Commander for investigation. Such investigations often uncover cases of child neglect, delinquency and other related parental misdemeanors.

A close working contact is maintained with all the city schools. The traffic safety is set up and periodically inspected by the Juvenile Officer with safety literature and pamphlets being furnished by the department.

Parents with child problems are often referred to the Juvenile Bureau. With the assistance of other agencies at our disposal we are able to help these families solve their difficulties.

## IDENTIFICATION BUREAU

The Identification Bureau, under the supervision of the Investigation Division and staffed by one man, performed the following services during the year 1963:


The Bureau mugged 771 prisoners, fingerprinted 1,076 prisoners, drew up and filed 423 criminal complaints in court. It mugged 108 civilians and fingerprinted 227 civilians. The Bureau processed 48 concealed weapons permits, 21 card dealer's permits, 11 taxi permits, and screened 82 applicants for solicitor's permits and Public Employment.

The Bureau took 142 photos at accident scenes, 238 photos at crime scenes, 78 photos of miscellaneous subjects and 64 photos for other city departments.

The Bureau processed 1,498 black and white negatives and developed 3,429 mug prints. Five hundred and sixty-six enlargements were made for court evidence and 96 enlargements for other city departments. It made 62 photo copies of checks, documents and related subjects and 46 photo copies for other city departments.

The Bureau also took 144 color photos for the Police Department and 123 color photos for other city departments.

As Liason Officer between the Police Department and the court, the Bureau gathered information ordered subpoenas and supplied information to the District Attorney's Office on 230 criminal court cases and transported 388 prisoners from the County jail to the court.

## RECORDS DIVISION

The Records Division of the Lodi Police Department has as its primary function the compiling and distribution of records. Among the duties entailed are:

1. Logging and distribution of warrants.
2. Maintaining current files on complaints and police activities.
3. Compiling of monthly, quarterly and annual reports.
4. Controlling budget and budget distribution for the Police Department and the Pound.
5. Maintaining inventory and inventory control.
6. Maintenance and preventative maintenance control for all police vehicles.
7. Compiling special reports as called for by the Chief of Police.

The Records Division is staffed by one supervisor and one steno-clerk. The supervisor is in charge of and responsible for the operation of the Records Division and the Pound.

The steno-clerk also acts as a Police Matron when the need arises.



## POUND

The City Pound is responsible for the licensing of domestic animals and the enforcement of laws pertaining to animals within the city.

During the year 1963, approximately 1,820 dogs and 750 cats were licensed in the city. The effective enforcement of licensing and the door-to-door selling of licenses at the beginning of the year holds animal complaints to a minimum.

The Poundmaster handles all complaints regarding animals within the city. During the month of January, additional help is utilized for issuance of animal licenses.

## TRAINING

Training, the process of developing and maintaining individual proficiency, commences from the moment a recruit officer is sworn in until the final process of retirement. With the ever increasing demands and responsibilities placed on police officers today, it is vital that training keeps pace with these changes. Successful completion of the department's functions depends upon the efficiency and success of proper training.

Basic training of all recruits is conducted through instructors within the department and the Concord Police Academy which provides a five-week Basic School. Half the cost of sending officers to the academy is subsidized from the California State Peace Officer's Training Fund.

In-service training is a continuing process and classes are held regularly with instructors from the department and from other agencies. Some of the courses made available to the officers during the past year have provided instruction on: Criminal Law and Evidence, Investigation, Supervisory Methods, Firearms, Radiological Monitoring, Planning and Research, Policy and Procedure, Fingerprinting, Photography, Public Relations, First Aid and instruction on new State Laws enacted this year.





